CATHEDRAL BUILDING



It's so easy, in the busy flow of activity, to lose track of God at work in and through our lives. As Trinity begins prepares to mark its 100th anniversary next year, we will be taking time to reflect on our life together as followers of Jesus, and to remember how God has been at work in and through us. Remembering how God has guided and supported the congregation in the past can highlight resources to draw from as we look to the future. On July 30, you will be able to begin working on a timeline for the congregation's history.

I'd like to share a story that reminds us to keep things rooted in what God is up to through what we are doing. "The story says that long ago a traveler from Italy came to the French town of Chartres to see the great church that was being built there. Arriving at the end of the day, he went to the site just as the workmen were leaving for home. He asked one man, covered with dust, what he did there. The man replied that he was a stonemason. He spent his days carving rocks. Another man, when asked, said he was a glassblower, who spent his days making slabs of colored glass. Still another workman replied that he was a blacksmith who pounded iron for a living.

Wandering in to the deepening gloom of the unfinished edifice, the traveler came upon an older woman, armed with a broom, sweeping up the stone chips and wood shavings and glass shards from the day's work. "What are you doing?" he asked. The woman paused, leaning on her broom, and looking up toward the high arches, replied, "Me? I'm building a cathedral for the Glory of Almighty God." (Quoted in *It Was on Fire When I Lay Down On It*, Robert Fulghum.)

Sometimes we think what we have to contribute isn't really all that important. The broom pusher simply cleans up after the artisans. The artisan's work will last, and pilgrims still look up in awe. The broom pusher's work is not supposed to even be noticed. It isn't likely to be seen as an asset for ministry. Yet she has the vision; she sees the Glory of Almighty God. She is not just doing a tedious job; she is Building a Cathedral.

God calls us to work together for the glory of God, to live the Good News, serving God's world in Jesus' name. In building this cathedral, some carve stone and some blow glass. Some preach, some teach, some cook meatloaf. And some push brooms. All these tasks are needed, and have value and dignity. They are assets, often overlooked in the grand scheme of things. It is easy to forget about the Cathedral of God's mission of loving us "no matter what," to lose sight of who we are and what God calls us to do. On Sunday August 20, Pastor Nancy Nyland will be with the congregation to help identify your unique and varied gifts for "cathedral-building." Keep looking for God at work, and for opportunities to identify and share your time, talents, and treasure in that ministry.

Did you know?

An "RMD" is a Required Minimum Distribution from your Traditional IRA. RMD is required beginning with tax year after you become 72 years old. RMDs remitted

directly to a Qualified Charity (such as Trinity Lutheran Church), are not included in your taxable income. Consequently, the income taxes you pay are less.


RMDs sent by the IRA administrator directly to a charity are "Qualified Charitable Distributions" (QCDs) and are not included in your taxable income subject to Federal or state income tax. QCDs are not deductible as an itemized deduction.

If you are required to have Required Minimum Distributions from your IRA accounts, speak to your Financial Advisor about QCDs. After consulting with your financial advisor, let your IRA custodian know you wish to make a QCD. Be sure to provide them with the information they request. Do not ask the IRA custodian to send the QCD to you. They must send the QCD directly to the charity.

Call Committee July Update

On June 25th, Pastor Nancy Nyland, Director for Evangelical Mission, I-K Synod, spoke to the congregation about a possible pastoral option for Trinity called "shared ministry." This option, allows a full-time Pastor to serve more than one congregation with some of his/her time with one congregation and the rest of the time with the other congregation. As such, Trinity would enter into an agreement with another congregation in how we might share that Pastor in ministry and possibly mission, as well. Those present on the 25th expressed an interest in exploring this option.

The following benefits of pursuing a "shared ministry" option are:

-An affordable option; may help move us out of a deficit position
-All our financial resources need not be committed to salaries/building maintenance
-Freeing up resources to do mission and ministry
-If desired, two congregations pooling their gifts for mission and ministry
-Allows us to thrive rather than survive
-It promotes a strong lay leadership model, where a high level of trust exists between Pastor, lay leaders, and the congregation
-Provides more freedom for moving forward with God's purpose for the people of Trinity
-We would develop a shared ministry covenant
-Six-month trial period prior to permanent agreement
