Faithful in the Cross-Currents



As we move into February, we are looking toward Lent, a time of spiritual preparation for deepening our trust in the saving work of Jesus. You could say it's "a matter of death and life" for us. Ash Wednesday falls on February 22 this year, and we will take time to remember that, as creatures, we will all die, but that in Christ, we have entered even now into a life that will ultimately not be held captive by death. Our worship service on Ash Wednesday will be at 7 pm. Each Wednesday after that for 5 weeks, we will gather at 6:00 pm for Soup and Salad suppers followed by a Lenten Worship Service that will begin at 6:45 pm.

The midweek services this year will highlight agents of God's work here in this world through the centuries. The church year calendar commemorates many of these faithful servants. Through the Lenten series "Sing with All the Saints in Glory," we will remember and give thanks for some of these Saints.

Last month we honored one of those wise ones who have gone before us, the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King. His legacy reminds us that struggles in our nation have flared in earlier generations, and the wisdom of leaders in the past can continue to help us now.

Our nation and our world still must deal with a very full load of trouble. Economic insecurity brings increased hunger and homelessness, diseases and disasters bring anxiety and disruption, and there are struggles over changes that people disagree about deeply. We try to figure how we should respond. How do we as followers of Jesus deal with overwhelming cross currents in these times of transition?

Dr. King wrestled with these same kinds of questions. I ran across this apt quotation from "Where Do We Go from Here?" his last presidential address at the Southern Christian Leadership Conference.


"There is nothing wrong with power if power is used correctly... And one of the great problems of history is that the concepts of love and power have usually been contrasted as opposites—polar opposites—so that love is identified with a resignation of power, and power with a denial of love.

Now power properly understood is nothing but the ability to achieve purpose. It is the strength required to bring about social, political, and economic change.

What is needed is a realization that power without love is reckless and abusive, and love without power is sentimental and anemic. Power at its best is love implementing the demands of justice, and justice at its best is power correcting everything that stands against love."

Micah 6, the Old Testament lesson for last Sunday, sheds light on God's way of being in our world: "Do justice, love kindness, and walk humbly with your God." May the Light of Christ guide your pathways in this new year.

ORGAN NEWS

Our new organ, the Opus 13, will be delivered on Sunday, February 19 after the service. Those that would like to stay and help unload are welcome, though it is not necessary. The parts will be laid out on the church pews. Monday work will begin to set up the organ. That first week will be to assemble the organ. Weeks 2, 3 and 4 will be for tonal finishing, final action adjustment, and final through-tuning. The end of week 4 is March 11. Details on the dedication have yet to be determined.

OUR 2022 ORGAN FUND UPDATE

The Organ Committee launched its pledge drive three years ago – Palm Sunday, April 14, 2019. We appreciate all gifts received to date. The **onsite organ construction work is now expected to begin in February**.

Through December 31, 2022, \$140,479 in cash gifts had been received and a total of \$132,113 had been paid to date (\$118,125 on the organ contract and \$13,988 for other construction costs). An estimated \$27,887 remains to be paid for the projected total cost of \$160,000. With outstanding pledges of \$5,772, there remains total unfunded costs of \$13,749. Although the use of "internal borrowing" is currently expected to be adequate to pay these unfunded costs, we welcome your continued support to help cover the estimated unfunded costs.




