The Joy in Uncertainty

I often listen to the radio while I'm driving, and I keep hearing the same commercials repeated over and over again. Commercials can tell you a lot about the world we live in. They tap into (or simply try to shape) what people are looking for in their lives and may be willing to pay money to get. The first thing this morning when I started my car, the ad for "California Psychics" came on. (It plays several times an hour.) In the midst of so many different stresses and difficult life decisions that a person may be called on to make, how can you be "certain" that you make the right ones? How can you find the "joy of certainty?"

Cue the commercial: "California Psychics is top quality -- only 2% of the many would-be California Psychics are chosen." Who knew there were that many aspiring psychics around to choose from? They offer "peace of mind in challenging times, validation for difficult decisions; insight for the next step forward; and bring closure and healing in grief." "The Joy of Certainty."

There's a special for new clients, of course: just \$20 for 20 minutes toward the first reading. The ad makes a remarkable promise, one that caught my theological radar: "Guaranteed life-changing or it's free." Real life-change takes time, and you can't buy it for \$20. I wondered how they would even make good on that promise of "free if it doesn't change your life." So, I checked the Web – a client can ask for refund one time in a month, within 24 hours of the call, and you get credit –no cash back–for another reading. Cue the fine print: "The service is provided for entertainment value. We don't guarantee that readers' predictions will come true, but we do our best to ensure that you enjoy the Readings."

In this season of Epiphany, we hear about Jesus calling his disciples, preaching and teaching, and healing. The call of Jesus is life-changing, and his "reading" of the human heart is worthy of our confidence. In the Gospel of Mark especially, the action is "immediate," and so, an encounter with Jesus is often "life-changing" in ways that may be immediately realized. The life-change offered by Jesus is received by faith, which is marked by "confidence" but not "certainty." With "certainty" you don't really need faith. As we enter the season of Lent (Ash Wednesday is February 14) we are reminded that what Jesus offers is both freely given, and very costly. It cost Jesus his life, and as followers of Jesus, we are freed to receive God's grace – so we can pick up our own costly service to others as a response of faith. Living in that faith, we can confidently celebrate joy even in the ever-present uncertainties of life.

Unified giving and other revenues for 2023 were \$11,797.41 higher than the previous year, and were \$7,550.52 higher than budget for the year. Expenses were \$10,933.23 lower than budget for the year, but much higher than the previous year. Year to date expenses exceeded revenues by just \$471.25. Obviously, this is much better than the budgeted deficit of \$18,955.

What is a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD)?

A Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) from an IRA is a wonderful way to support Trinity's ministries and receive key tax benefits.

Here's how it works: Under IRS tax law, at age 72 you are required to withdraw from your Individual Retirement Account (IRA) a certain amount of money known as your Required Minimum Distributions (RMDs). These distributions made directly to you are taxed as they are withdrawn. However, taxpayers over age 70½ can have their QCD paid directly to their church from their IRA, and thereby avoid federal income tax on this money while supporting the ministries of their church.

Please consult with your tax or legal advisor about proceeding with your QCD gift plan.



TUESDAY ZOOM BIBLE STUDY 11:30-12:30 COME AS YOU ARE!

The banner I liked displayed three symbols of our faith, (the Fish, the Candle, and the Chalice with stalks of wheat), however all symbols were incorporated into one panel piece, which also emphasized the colors of purple, blue and green. The seams are ¼" wide and the raw edges are finished in a zigzag stitch to prevent unraveling from washing. Each panel measures 15 ½" X 50" for a total measurement of 46 ½" X 50" when all three panels are used together.

January 28, 2024-Trust-By Sandy Teeters

I decided to make a banner that could be used during the seasons of Epiphany and/or Pentecost. My inspiration came from a picture of a banner which contained inspirational verses. The heart and cross came from an embroidery web site, and I knew it had to be the focal piece. The eight pointed rotated gold star with the gold cross in the middle represents our faith. All seams are ¼ inch wide, the raw edges are finished in a zigzag stitch to prevent raveling, and stabilizer fabric is utilized on the embroidered pieces. The completed banner measures 41 1/2" by 52 ½ "and can be hung by inserting a rod into the sleeve at the top of the panel.




