## The Spirit's Enough



# The Lamplighter

On May 28, we celebrate Pentecost, the work of the Holy Spirit in our lives. The E-Connect process that Trinity has been working on began by exploring our own spiritual connection to God, individually and as a congregation. Pastor Nancy Nyland helped to facilitate this process, and she will continue her work here through several Trinity visits in the next few weeks. On June 25, she will share her experience with shared ministry models; and on August 20, she will help the congregation map the assets, gifts for ministry that the Spirit has given to congregation members; and on September 9, Pastor Nancy will work with leaders at Trinity to revisit Trinity Congregation's purpose and mission.

The Spirit works within a congregation through those conversations that folks, open to the leading of that Spirit, have with each other, seeing them as the highway for the Holy Spirit. These conversations help answer the fundamental questions "who are we?" "who is our neighbor?" and "what does God want us to be doing here and now?" The E-Connect team will be coordinating some tasks that will help to answer these basic questions, such as the activity of interviewing our neighbors about their sense of who the congregation is, and what they think the community needs are.

This week, I joined in a conversation among some pastors and professors that got me to thinking about how to answer those three basic questions for mission. The presenter, David Zahl, is the author of *Seculosity: How Career, Parenting, Technology, Food, Politics, and Romance Became Our New Religion and What To Do About It* by Minneapolis: Fortress Press, 2019. Seculosity, a "new" word that combines "secular" and "religiosity," leans upon Luther's definition of a god as "that to which we look for all good and in which we find refuge in every time of need."

*Seculosity* makes the case that being religious is alive and well in modern society. This is helpful in understanding who our "neighbor" is, and who we sometimes find ourselves trying to be as well. A review by Matthew Metevelis observes that "while American organized religion may be declining, the desire to fill the void with everyday life pursuits is another form of worship. To fill the emptiness left by religion, humans look to all sorts of activities -- food, family, relationships, social media, elections, social justice movements -- for identity, purpose, and meaning once provided by organized religion."

Our increasingly secular world is driven by what Zahl terms a quest for "enoughness" – which more traditionally religious terminology calls "righteousness" or "justification." But this quest keeps on falling short, crippling folks with anxiety (Am I enough?), shame (Do they think I'm enough?), and guilt (Have I done enough?). Zahl suggests that inside of the human spirit there are two competing "persons" – one that strives to be perfect, and one that accuses us where we fall short of that. Our neighbors – and each of us too, if we are truly honest – contend with "ferocious and demanding idol within, a worshiped image of the self we ought to be. This is where the law digs in to its deadly work of saying 'not enough.'" I find this useful in addressing the questions of "who are we" and "who is our neighbor" – how do we understand and articulate what is going on spiritually in our "here and now?" Surely whatever our answer to "what does God want us to be doing?" will be informed by the Word that Jesus is "God's more-than-enough for our not-enough."

## Call Committee Event

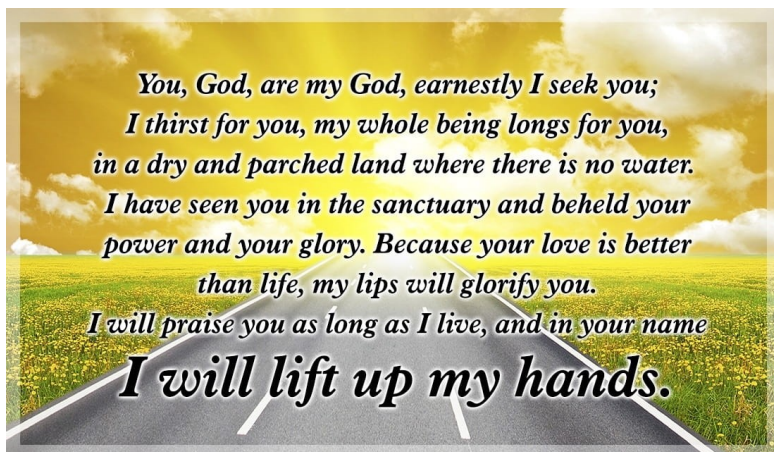
Pastor Nancy Nyland, Director of Evangelical Mission, IK Synod, to preach and speak on "shared ministry" on Sunday, June 25th.

## E-Connect Team News!

**YOUR Trinity E-connect team** spent another overnight of worship and education with the Synod trainers on May 12 and 13. These **LINK 2 meetings** were held in the beautiful setting of the St. Benedict Retreat Center, Beech Grove. We met with our “sister” congregation in the E-connect process, Faith Lutheran of Goshen, Indiana. There was evening and morning worship in the chapel. We shared scripture readings, prayers and learned new songs. Time for quiet and reflection helped us prepare to learn.

We were able to report on where we are in this *transformation* process, personally and in our congregations. We have completed some tasks, gathering information about our congregation members, and beginning to see the resources we have at Trinity.

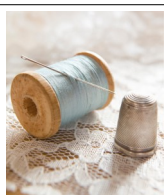
### Some topics/activities we did in LINK 2:

- ◇ Using crayons and paper—drawing a “map” of the neighborhood around our church building. It was revealing to see the similarities and differences between maps! **Special emphasis** on organizations which might be a partner for us or be a resource.
- ◇ We practiced interviewing each other with a set of questions. For homework we are to interview 7-10 local leaders or important resource organizations and/or nearby potential partners we can talk to.
- ◇ We talked about the difference between doing ministry **FOR versus WITH others—ministry WITH deepens relationships.**
- ◇ We learned about **ASSETS**—focusing on what we **have** and trusting Christ and the Holy Spirit for the rest. **ENOUGH is PLENTY** to do God’s will.
- ◇ Managing change and dealing with resistance to progress was discussed. Change is **HARD! Leading with love and respect THROUGH the process is essential.**

### LOOK AHEAD for these events:

- ◇ We will host an event for the congregation to help us further reveal the personal, structural, and financial **assets** we have. Pastor Nancy Nyland will facilitate this session.
- ◇ We will have a meeting later this year with the team and council and anyone else who wants to participate to review our statements of purpose, mission, and values. This workshop will also be led by Pastor Nancy Nyland. **STAY TUNED for further info.**
- ◇ We will be planning a **new service activity** to impact our neighborhood or community in a positive way.
- ◇ We received as a token of LINK 2 learning this small olive wood cross. **See the beautiful swirls of the grain?**

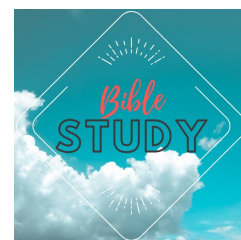
## **Tuesday Zoom Bible Study 11:30-12:30 COME as you ARE!**

### OUR 2023 ORGAN FUND UPDATE

The Organ Committee launched its pledge drive four years ago – Palm Sunday, April 14, 2019. **We truly appreciate all gifts received to date, which has exceeded our expectations.** God has blessed Trinity Lutheran Church in this effort to enhance our worship and praise.

#### Financial Summary:

Total cost (\$151,436 paid to date*)	\$157,999

\* The remaining installment of \$6,563 is expected to be paid in May after the final “voicing” of the organ is completed. The contractor had substantial savings on the drayage cost by using a U-Haul truck for delivery instead of using a delivery service. This savings more than offset the higher than original estimates for mileage and per diem expenses included in the estimated total cost of \$160,000.

\*\*Any excess funds raised will be used toward periodic maintenance charges that the new organ will require beginning in late 2024 at the earliest. **If you have an outstanding pledge, you may choose to redirect your future planned gifts from the organ fund to unified giving to help address the deficit in the operating budget.**

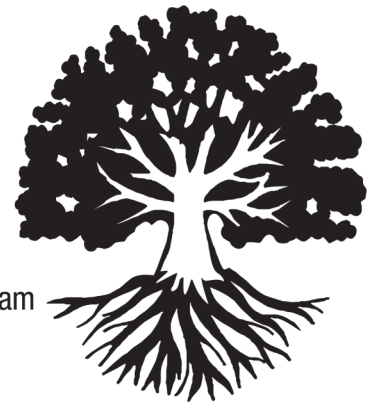
