



What to Do About Evil?

We've started our observance of the season of Lent with Ash Wednesday, February 22. Last month, our Gospel lessons were giving us a taste of the challenging teachings of Jesus from the Sermon on the Mount, a section of the Gospel of Matthew. Love your enemies. Pray for those who abuse you. Hard stuff. Hard stuff, especially in a context where the divisions and dissentions in our society are so grating.

Amid the discouraging avalanche of stories these days about abuses of power—vicious bullying, random violence, accusations of sexual misconduct, actions that leave whole groups of persons out in the cold and cut off from recognition and respect -- how should followers of Jesus respond? How do we deal with the evil that we encounter in our lives, especially when we or those we love are the targets? We pray in the Lord's Prayer "deliver us from evil" but what should we do while we hope for God to answer that prayer?

Jesus tells us to love our enemies, to pray for those who abuse us, to refrain from judging others, to "do unto others as we would have them do unto us," the Golden Rule. But how does this actually work out for those who are the victims of evil? In Matthew 5:38-41, Jesus preaches: You have heard that it was said, "An eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth." But I say to you, do not resist an evildoer. But if anyone strikes you on the right cheek, turn the other also; and if anyone wants to sue you and take your coat, give your cloak as well; and if anyone forces you to go one mile, go also the second mile

So, is Jesus simply saying to the victims of evil, too bad for you, maybe God will fix it somehow in this life, but at any rate, in heaven you'll be OK—so pray for your abuser and just take it? Does this mean, for example, that a wife who is terrified because her abusive husband has been escalating the attacks must submit, "turn the other cheek" and just keep praying and hiding the bruises? Is there no other option?


The Rev. Walter Wink, in his book *The Powers That Be*, offers a helpful insight into what Jesus might have been actually saying. He notes that the Greek word "resist" indicates that we are not to resist *violently*. The Apostle Paul writes about this: "Do not return *evil* for evil" (Romans 12: 17).

There are creative non-violent ways to respond to evil, and Jesus gives some examples. These examples show behavior that, in Jesus' day, would have significance that we don't pick up from simply reading the words. Matthew includes a detail about "turning the other cheek" that might seem a little random, but it isn't. "If someone strikes you on the <u>right</u> cheek In that culture, the left hand was used only for unclean tasks. There were strict laws and customs. So, hitting someone on the right cheek, with the right hand, would mean hitting with the back of the hand-- a backslap, which was how someone would put someone else down. To hit the "other cheek," the *left* cheek, with the right hand meant you needed to use a fist, not a backhand. This fist-fight would indicate an encounter between equals. So, if someone intended to dishonor you by treating you as inferior, by "turning the other cheek" you would give them a choice. Treat you like an equal or walk away unsuccessful in the attempt to lord it over you.

The "go the second mile" example reflects a rule that the occupying Roman soldiers could command any local person they met to carry their heavy packs for one mile, and *not any more* than that. So "going the second mile" not only tells the occupying force that you are not owned by them, it was also likely to get the soldier into trouble. So, imagine a Roman soldier asking to get his pack back? So yes, resist evil, but non-violently and creatively, humbly honoring the shared humanity of the enemy while not playing by the enemy's rules. Hate never heals hate. Only love can do that. Jesus wants us all to play by his life-transforming rules: love one another—when it is easy, and when it is not.

OUR 2022 ORGAN FUND UPDATE

The Organ Committee launched its pledge drive three years ago - Palm Sunday, April 14, 2019. We appreciate all gifts received to date. The **onsite organ construction work is now expected to begin** the week of February 19th.

Through January 31, 2022, **\$141,746 in cash gifts** had been received and a total of \$132,113 had been paid to date (\$118,125 on the organ contract and \$13,988 for other construction costs). An estimated \$27,887 remains to be paid for the projected total cost of \$160,000. With outstanding pledges of \$3,965, there remains total **unfunded costs of \$14,289**. Although the use of "internal borrowing" is currently expected to be adequate to pay these unfunded costs, we welcome your continued support to help cover the estimated unfunded costs.



The evening of **February 8th** the team met at Afdahl's for dinner and to meet with Pastor Nancy Nyland from the IK Synod office and layperson John Dahl who supports the E-connect teams. Our meal was delicious and set the stage for a productive meeting. Many thanks to

Pastor Karen presented devotions from Matthew 17:1-9, the transfiguration of Christ. We talked about the similarities/contrasts of transfiguration to transformation. As we progress thru the E-connect process we will be changed. We hope to pass these positive spiritual changes on to the rest of our church family.

Most of the meeting was spent in reviewing the result of the Congregational *Vitality* Survey which 29 participants from our congregation filled out. Here is more information about the survey:

The Congregational Vitality Survey is a tool to help congregations assess where they see themselves as a congregation. Leadership and Congregation members take the survey separately so that the we can see if there is unity between leadership and congregation or if there is a disparity between the two. They survey is helpful because it gives a good picture on what people "think" is happening. The survey results can be held up against actual facts to see if there are some "ministry myths" preventing us from moving ministry forward. A good response rate would be at least **half of your average worship attendance**. While that seems to be a low number, it will at least capture enough of the prevailing opinions in the congregation to be effective.

Processing the results is not about simply receiving them, but taking the time to discuss them, prayerfully digging deeper into some areas that seem to rise to the top, and making plans for action steps to move the ministry forward in ways that advance God's desires for the ministry. It is a tool to begin a conversation and new ways of working together to strengthen the whole church and participate in the mission of God to love and bless the world. 


DOMAIN 1—The congregation's connection with GOD:

How well do these phrases describe your congregation?


Q1: Worship nurtures people's faith




Q2: Deepens people's relationship with God




Q4: Excitement about the congregation's future



Q3: Clear sense of Mission




Q5: Always ready to try something new
